
- Where did Y2 go to learn more about flight?

The children were fascinated to find out about under the sea and loved having the chance to investigate 'real' fish and crabs.








A spaceship crash landing on the mounds was very exciting and prompted lots of questions about planets, the universe, astronauts and the space station.



Summer News from 34B

In our last Science based LCC, we explored magnetism, including how magnets repel or attract materials, magnetic poles and links to the Earth's magnetic force field. Using a range of information texts and the information gained from LCC, we wrote our own explanation texts in English.

Towards the end of the year, we learnt about the main features of a River. Within this geography based LCC topic we learnt about the water cycle and the importance rivers have on human civilisation. We learnt about

During English, the children wrote an explanation text to answer our LCC topic question 'What is Magnetism?' Throughout our River topic, we explored the journey of a river using the text 'The Rhythm of Rain'. In English, we explored the features of a persuasive letter and wrote a persuasive letter to Littleport's council to help maintain the River Great Ouse cleanliness.

This term the year 4s have been working hard on the Arts Mark. We have explored different art forms and Claude Monet's work. With a dance coach from 4D Dance, we created a brilliant river themed dances and learnt a range of dance techniques that we were able to perform on a stage!



While the year 4s were busy creating their dance, the year 3s have been learning how to use Scratch, a computing programme. We designed and created a sprite on Scratch before programming code to tell our sprite what to do.

Year 3/4 had a visit from Witchford Sports Partnership to teach us orienteering. We learnt how to read a map, including symbols and worked in small groups to follow a map around the playground. Each checkpoint had a number which we had to add up at the end. Some Year 3s attended a tennis and tri-golf festival in Ely. We learnt lots of new skills and had fun!


Summer News from 56K

Since October half term, we have enjoyed Millfield Book Club every Tuesday afternoon. Adults from around school have shared a book of their choice with Year 1 to Year 6, which has allowed staff and children to enjoy a variety of exciting and tempting texts. Some texts include non-fiction, graphic novels, poetry, picture books, chapter books, choose your own adventure books and many more!







There are many amazing displays around school and in various classroom, which have been inspired by the children!



In September, we will be continuing our Reading for Pleasure programme and will share more of our journey with you all.

Summer Music with Mrs Clough

It has been a busy Summer Term of music at Millfield. As well as our regular class music activities years 1, 2, 3 and 4 and our school choir have been busy practising for a performance which we did on stage in school in early July. It was a wonderful experience for the children and I was so proud of them performing with such confidence. Well done to all!

Our Reception children have loved listening to many styles of music and singing lots of counting and action songs. They have enjoyed playing different percussion instruments and worked really hard to keep the pulse on boomwhackers, play a repeated rhythm on an untuned percussion instrument and improvise on the glockenspiels. We had so much fun playing claves, tambourines and lollipop drums and marching around the room just like a real marching band!





Our Year One children have enjoyed improvising and creating their own music as a class using boomwhackers and other percussion instruments. They have listened carefully to musical instructions and had a go at playing a riff on the glockenspiels. They have had lots of opportunities to perform to each other and it was fantastic to see and hear them up on stage singing in unison and in a 2 part round.





Our Year 2 children have worked hard to develop their recorder playing skills this term. They have learnt to play the notes B, A, G, E and D and their musical theory knowledge continues to grow and improve each week. They have enjoyed the challenge of working individually and in small groups to read, practise and play music on the boomwhackers and glockenspiels to be performance ready! They performed brilliantly with such confidence! They have also had a go at using an online composition package to create their own music as a class and continued to listen to and appraise different styles of music.





In Years 3 and 4 we listened to the story 'A River' by Marc Martin and used this as inspiration to compose music telling the story of a river's journey. The children explored the sounds of the different musical instruments first and then decided on the order in which they should play them. They worked hard to include different dynamics and tempos in the performances of their pieces. They have also enjoyed playing the glockenspiels to explore pitch and gain confidence when improvising.



In Years 5 and 6 we learnt about the pentatonic scale and had a go at improvising and performing using just these 5 notes of the C major scale. The children especially enjoyed composing and performing their own song/piece of music on a theme of their choice. They chose whether to work individually, in pairs or small groups and had to draw on all of their musical knowledge including structure, texture, dynamics, tempo, pulse and rhythm to create and perform.





Our School Choir has continued to impress me with their focus and dedication. They performed again - 4 songs which included unaccompanied, round and harmony singing.





A huge well done to the children that took piano and singing exams this term too. James, Jacob, Alicia and Maisie, we are very proud of you!



I will miss teaching Music at Millfield in September. I am so proud of what the children have achieved in the last 2 years and wish them many more happy, musical adventures. In the words of Abba....."Thank You For The Music!"

Arts Festival Day

On Friday 8th July the whole of Millfield school, staff and children, took part in a Festival Day to celebrate the Arts.

As part of a TEFAT Arts Award/Artsmark project involving a number of schools our Year 4 children have been working really hard with a dancer and choreographer from 4D Dance this half term. They helped to create their dance works, rehearsed with commitment and enjoyed performing them on a 'pop-up' stage with lighting and sound provided by The Young Tech Academy. All of this work, along with a sketch book they are producing, will help the children to receive an Explore or Discover Arts Award Certificate in the Autumn Term.





Having this huge stage on the field at Millfield was such an exciting experience and we are so pleased that we involved the whole school in having the opportunity to perform on it. From Reception to Year 6, not forgetting the choir, we had performances of poetry, singing, dancing and instruments. It was an amazing celebration of the Arts and our talented children. We are so proud of them all for getting up on that stage and performing in front of the whole school!





As well as these performances we all took part in learning and performing a communal dance with BaseDance artist Diccon who was touring with the stage, we had a lunch time disco which was so much fun, we watched a magic show and we took part in a range of different Arts/Festival activities including painting, willow weaving, hair braiding, mask/hat making, a parade, face painting and wearing temporary tattoos.
