

In our painting sessions we used acrylic paint to create build colours and textures to create abstract art on the theme of 'Space'.







In science we have explored the origins of life on Earth and inheritance of characteristics in humans and animals. We had great fun experimenting with 'beak types' and different 'foods' to see which adaptation would allow birds to pass on their characteristics most successfully. The children were excellent scientists and engaged wonderfully in scientific thinking and enquiry.

Our second science learning challenge was based on Earth and Space and I would like to thank you all for the amazing projects that your children created. These have been displayed in school for everyone to enjoy. The children were engaged and enquiring about this fascinating topic leading to many Google searches by both them and me!







As a school, we are focusing on ensuring that children find reading fun and that they choose to read for pleasure. I have redesigned our classroom to create social spaces for the children to read and we are encouraging children to read for pleasure by displaying books that are tempting! Some of our current favourites are the Roman Garstang series by Mark Lowry, the Amulet graphic novel series by Kazu Kibuishi and Eric by Shaun Tan. I know lots of children have enjoyed exploring new types of books this term because they have been telling me! Some of the comments include

"I never thought I'd enjoy a graphic novel but I loved Roller Girl - can I read it at lunchtime?"

"Would it be ok to take this book out at playtime I need to finish it"

"Can you read The Jam Doughnut book to us please! It's so funny how does the author think up those things?"

This term always seems so quick as we zoom towards Christmas. Although we have taken some tests, we have had lots of fun too! The children have really seized the opportunity to be astronomers, biologists, naturalists and sci-fi writers as well as keen mathematicians. Our book corner has been revamped and the children are enjoying reading for pleasure: we have a range of fun books but more "Ripley's Believe it or Not!" and similar are always welcome!

In science we have explored the origins of mankind and inheritance of characteristics. We looked at what we inherit and what we learn - why animals adapt to fit their environment better. We wrote some fabulous "Just So stories" to link to this. We also looked at our solar system and the children made some really inspiring projects about it which have been displayed these past weeks. Linked to this, the children wrote some scary stories about the invasion of the Earth based on "War of the Worlds" by H G Wells and made them into books of their own.









We are trying to engage the children creatively and have produced some beautiful artworks based on the Futurist art movement of the early 20th century, introducing the children to cubism and abstract art.

Lastly, the children have begun to learn how to code using Scratch which they are really enjoying.

I am sure next term will be equally packed. As ever, we are appreciative of all the efforts the students make.

I know the children have enjoyed exploring new types of books and sharing their love of reading through our weekly 'Let's talk books' question.

Autumn Music with Mrs Clough

We have had such a wonderful Autumn Term of Music at Millfield. As well as weekly music lessons for all children from Reception to Year 6 we have had weekly singing assemblies, a visit from Rocksteady music school, our 'Christmas Choir' have sung for Littleport WI and The Grange and we have lots more planned for the Spring Term.





Our youngest children in Nursery have enjoyed exploring instruments by shaking, rubbing and tapping. They explored loud, quiet, fast and slow playing and enjoyed listening to different rhythms.

In Reception the children have enjoyed music as part of their 'Exploring and Learning' time and played drums, boomwhackers, glockenspiels and other mixed percussion instruments. Recently they have been listening to different styles of music and dancing to the beat as well as playing instruments loudly, quietly, quickly and slowly. They have sung familiar songs, thinking about high and low sounds, and added instrumental

accompaniments.





In Key Stages One and Two the children have worked extremely hard and are developing their musical skills every week. We have listened to different styles of music including pop, folk, jazz, classical and 20th century orchestral. The children are becoming more confident at using musical vocabulary such as dynamics, texture. pulse, tempo, pitch and structure when talking about music and they are able to express likes and dislikes. It is so wonderful to be able to sing in our lessons again and the children have all sung in unison, in a round and had the opportunity to sing a solo. Instruments are a big part of our weekly music lessons and all children have experienced playing and performing this term.

In Year 1 the children loved singing and dancing to the song 'Dem Bones' which linked in with their LCC topic and choosing an instrument to represent each bone was lots of fun! They have also explored lots of percussion instruments including the boomwhackers which gave us the opportunity to discuss tempo,

dynamics and pitch.





In Year 2 the children have loved playing different rhythms and familiar pieces of music on the Boomwhackers. They have also had the opportunity to improvise using mixed percussion instruments and to create/compose their own music linked to their LCC topics of 'Animals' and 'Toys'. The children recorded their compositions in such creative ways to reflect dynamics and tempo. I was very impressed!













In Years 3 and 4 the children have been learning to play the ukulele. They have learnt to play single string notes, fretted notes and chords as well as learning about the different parts of the instrument. They have enjoyed playing along to music, a favourite track was 'The Lion Sleeps Tonight.' They had a go at composing their own pieces of music using single string notes and mixed percussion instruments too.





In Years 5 and 6 the children have been learning to play the recorder. They have played rhythms on the notes they have learnt, been reading the notes on the musical stave, improvised using different notes and really enjoyed composing their own musical pieces on the recorder while using mixed percussion instruments as an accompaniment.





It is so fantastic to see the children enjoying music and to hear them talking about music outside of their music lessons! Confidence when singing and playing is growing all of the time and that is just brilliant! Happy Christmas and I look forward to an exciting and musical 2022. Mrs Clough

Throughout school, reading areas celebrate our love of reading and are full of tempting texts for the children.

All staff have tried to change their reading areas so that they recommend specific genres for children to continue reading a genre they love or for them to try something new. Some classrooms show the children's tempting choices of text from the library, so they can share and recommend an exciting new text with their peers. Books are displayed around the room for the children to read and share tempting texts and some reading areas have voting station for the children to vote for their class reader everyday. Now there is a fantastic reading area in school for reading annuals!

Every Tuesday adults in school have, and continue to, take it in turns to share a text or book they've loved with all children during Millfield Book Club. So far, we've heard a range of texts from non-fiction pocket books to poetry to beautifully illustrated picture books. The children have thoroughly enjoyed listening to a range of texts but have clearly had their preferences.
